Weber Arena will be the site again this year for the K-State College Rodeo, February 17-19. This is the 66th year K-State has hosted the event. It was voted Central Plains Region College Rodeo of the Year in 2022.

Performances will be Friday at 7:30 p.m., Saturday at 1:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., and Sunday's short-go will be at 1:00 p.m. Slack will run Friday and Saturday mornings at 9:00 a.m. Friday's performance is Tough Enough to Wear Pink Night as a show of support for those with breast cancer. A rodeo for those with special needs will be held Saturday at 11:30 a.m. For the Saturday afternoon performance, kids 12 and under will get in free with the donation of one canned good for the Flint Hills Breadbasket food



bank. The Saturday evening performance will be purple night in Weber. A cowboy church service, open to the public, will take place Sunday morning at 10:00 a.m. in the grandstands. Sunday will be Military Appreciation Day at the rodeo. The Fort Riley Mounted Color Guard will perform opening ceremonies Sunday at 12:30 p.m.

All K-State rodeo alumni and friends are invited to attend a special social during the rodeo. It will be held Saturday afternoon from 4:00 to 6:00 at R.C. McGraws. Bring your old pictures and memorabilia to reminisce with others!

Advance tickets are \$10 and will be available beginning January 18 at Orscheln in Manhattan and Junction City, Yee-Haw, Outpost Western Store, the Call Hall Dairy Bar and R Bar B in Topeka.



SPRING SEASON AHEAD FOR RODEO TEAM

K-State Rodeo Team Coach Casy Winn reports the student athletes are off to a solid start, with much of the season yet to take place this spring. The K-State women's team is ninth in the Central Plains region after fall rodeos at Colby, Durant, Stillwater and Alva. Kyleigh Winn is ninth in the breakaway standings, with Sydney Tastad and Haley Vollmer also qualifying for short-goes in the fall. Coach Winn said the men's team is tenth at this point, led by Sage and Luke Dierks, who are tenth in the team roping, and Tom Harmon, who is eighth in the bull riding.

The K-State team will compete at six rodeos this spring before qualifications are determined for the 2023 College National Finals in Casper, WY. In addition to the K-State college rodeo February 16-18 in Manhattan, remaining Central Plains Region rodeos will take place at Fort Scott Community College, Garden City Community College, Southwestern Oklahoma State University, Fort Hays State University and Panhandle State University.

PLANS PROGRESS TOWARD NEW SITE FOR K-STATE COLLEGE RODEO

A major and multifaceted facilities project for the K-State College of Agriculture will enhance many aspects of the Department of Animal Sciences & Industry (AS&I), including opportunities for K-State Rodeo. A key part of this project is a new livestock competition arena that is planned to be built adjacent to the existing Burtis outdoor arena. According to AS&I Department Head Mike Day, the annual K-State college rodeo is one of many functions that will transition to the 130' x 250' indoor arena with seating capacity of about 3,000. Temporary housing for livestock to be used for teaching and to support the annual college rodeo and an 80' x 80' staging/warm up area connected to the main facility are included with the arena, along with many other components to support the activities. The arena will be coupled with major renovations at the AS&I Horse Unit, including the addition of teaching space, replacement of the headquarters and breeding facility, construction of a stall barn and other upgrades. A future phase of further improvements is planned for both the arena and Horse Unit, including addi-

tional animal housing for the arena and further facility and pen upgrades at the Horse Unit.

In addition to providing a larger arena floor to support the college rodeo, the new competition arena will offer a modern facility with greater access for rodeo contestants, stock and fans. Accessibility to Weber Arena from the K-State rodeo headquarters adjacent to Burtis Arena has become increasingly challenging in recent years given the growth of campus to the north of Weber Hall. Space is finite for animals, contestants and trailers to support the rodeo at Weber Hall. Support space will become a greater challenge with the construction of a new building to replace Schellenberger Hall between Call Hall and Weber Hall. This is one component of the greater and multifaceted College of Agriculture project.

According to Day, it is an exciting time for K-State, the College of Agriculture and AS&I in terms of upgrading facilities to support the teaching, research and extension missions and many of the student, youth and stakeholder programs that are core to AS&I and K-State.

K-STATE GRAD FINISHES NINTH IN THE WORLD

K-State rodeo alumnus Tanner Brunner of Ramona, KS, finished ninth in the world steer wrestling standings for the recently completed 2022 Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association season. Brunner

had a hot finish at the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo (WNFR) in Las Vegas, NV, placing in four of the last five go-arounds at the 10-head event. When all was said and done, Brunner threw all 10 steers down in 69.2 seconds for fifth in the average.

Last year was Brunner's fourth qualification for the WNFR. His career earnings exceed \$600,000. He is a 2016 K-State graduate with a degree in animal sciences & industry. While on the K-State Rodeo Team, Brunner qualified for the College National Finals Rodeo in 2014 and 2015.

All of his immediate family also competed in college

rodeo at K-State. This includes his father Tracy Brunner, mother Yvonne Brunner and sister Lauren "Cat" Brunner. He also has aunts and uncles who were on the K-State Rodeo Team.

The K-State rodeo family is proud to call Tanner one of its own!

WILDCAT RODEO ATHLETES HONORED BY NIRA

Four K-State Rodeo Team members were named 2022 Scholar American recipients by the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA). Sage Dierks, Carlie Jones, Sami O'Day and Haley Vollmer were honored nationally for meeting the criteria of having earned points at sanctioned 2021-2022 NIRA rodeos and achieving a 3.5 grade point average. The students were nominated by Coach Casy Winn.
